Disaster-related grant award money runs out too quickly



Irregularities in contract awards



Nepotism and favoritism in contracting



Unreasonable contract costs for services or services not provided



Misuse of authority to unfairly influence decision makers



Inferior quality or inflated costs for products and services



No show or ghost employees



Suspicious contract bidding trends and patterns



Suspicious, new or unverifiable vendors
